5. ECOLOGICAL WISDOM We work to use our resources in a way that does not use them up in one or two generations. Recognizing we are a part, not separate from nature, we work for agricultural practices that replenish the soil, energy policy that doesn't pollute and lifestyles that respect the integrity of the natural world. In doing so, we believe a healthy economy will be ensured.

6. NON-VIOLENCE While we recognize the need for self-defense and the defense of others in helpless situations, we also work to eliminate weapons of mass destruction and develop effective alternatives to violence at all levels—family, streets, nations and the planet.

7. SOCIAL JUSTICE AND EQUAL OPPORTUNITY We work to remove all barriers that deny fair treatment, equal justice and equal economic opportunities.

8. PERSONAL AND GLOBAL RESPONSIBILITY We work to empower individuals to take responsibility in their own lives and to join with others to foster economic justice, environmental balance, social harmony and the health of the planet in our local regions, our nation and our world.

9. GENDER EQUITY AND COOPERATION We work to develop cooperative ways of interacting that respect differences of gender and opinion and equality of opportunity for all. We work to develop human values with moral conscience.

10. RESPECT FOR DIVERSITY We value all cultural, ethnic, racial, sexual and religious backgrounds. We work to develop leadership and contributions in all. And we work to cultivate and encourage the respect for and preservation of the biodiversity of all life forms.

1. Q: What percentage of the world's population does the U.S. have?

A: 6%

2. Q: What percentage of the world's wealth does the U.S. have?

A: 50%
